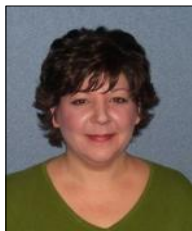

Judge's Notes from Amateur Gun Dog

Brace 1 Boone had a close race with one find at 20 and a find in the bird field. Unacceptable retrieve. Miss T was picked up for being too friendly with the bird.

Brace 3 Scratch in 2 move up to bye dog, Billy had a stylish find at 8 all in order. He ran a close race but with style. Find in bird field handled ok but refused to retrieve. Phoebe hunted hard but close. Backed and then turned away from the pointing dog on the back course. Was nice on bird in bird field but refused to retrieve.

Brace 4 Rocky had a find at 8 and 15. Ticked on point until handler moved in front of him, backed at 10 and blew a back at 18. Greta had a find at 10 all in order but broke on the gun in the bird field.

Brace 5 Joey ran one of the better races but refused to retrieve. LZ was with the other judge and was picked up early.

Brace 5 Bella was close hunting and too many conversations with handler which brought dog back to handler. Bella had a nice find with very good style in the bird field held for 2 shots. When sent on command to retrieve the bird took flight and she took it out of the air and retrieved it to hand.

Macy moved up from brace2, had a great race with style, always to the front. Macy had a stylish find at 7 and a very stylish find in the bird field with a retrieve to hand.

Macy was our first place dog. Bella earned fourth since she lacked range and speed in her bid but was very stylish on her birds.

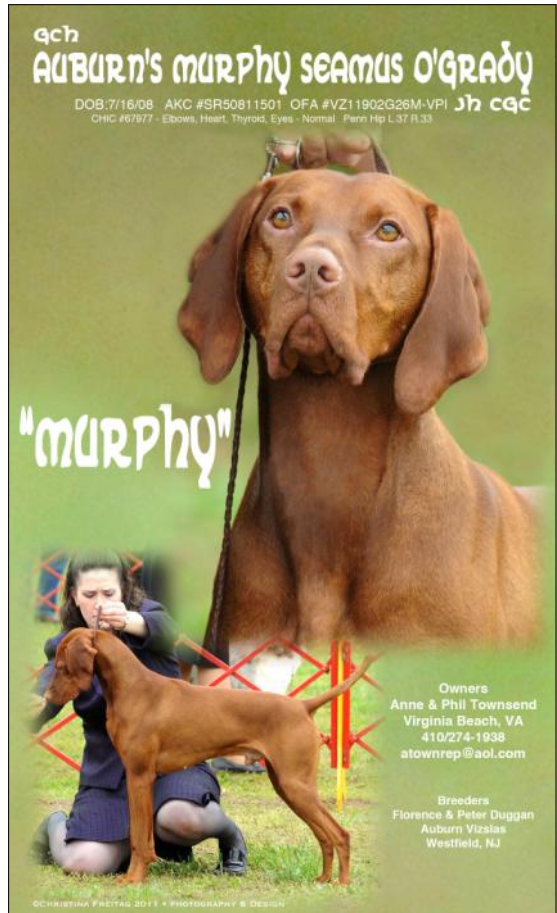

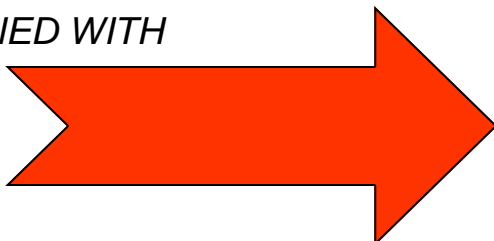

Ask the Vet

Q: My dog has developed a fatty tumor on her back leg that doesn't seem to bother her. My veterinarian says it is probably a lipoma. What are lipomas and where do they come from?

A: Lipomas are well-encapsulated, benign tumors made

up of fat tissue. They are reported to occur in 16% or more of dogs. They are more common in middle aged or older dogs and may be more frequent in overweight pets. Lipomas can be found anywhere in the body, although most commonly occur under the skin of the trunk or limbs. Like most tumors, the exact cause is not known. It is probably a combination of genetic and environmental factors.

Like all benign tumors, lipomas do not spread to other places on the body. However, sometimes they still cause problems. If located in a high-motion area, like under a leg, a large lipoma can interfere with mobility. Lipomas inside the skull can push on the brain and cause neurologic symptoms. Lipomas in locations prone to trauma or that press on nerves or muscles can cause pain.

The largest lipoma I have ever removed was the size of a basketball. Obviously it was causing distress to the dog, despite being technically benign.

If a lipoma causes symptoms, it should be removed. Complete excision is curative. Most lipomas do not cause problems and can be safely left alone. Before treating with "benign neglect,"

however, it is important to differentiate lipomas from more serious imposters.

Infiltrative lipomas are not encapsulated and can spread between tissue layers deep into the body. Infiltrative lipomas are difficult to cure without limb amputation, although early excision offers the best hope. Liposarcomas are cancerous "fatty masses" that can spread throughout the body. Liposarcomas are typically fatal. Mast cell tumors are benign-looking skin cancers that can be mistaken for lipomas.

In a dog with any new mass, I recommend examination by a veterinarian. For the first few "fatty masses" on a pet, I like to perform a fine-needle aspirate and microscopic evaluation of the cells. With this technique, I have caught several cancers masquerading as lipomas – some of which were assumed to be benign by other veterinarians. After three successive lipomas in the same patient, I am generally more comfortable assuming additional "fatty masses" continue to be lipomas.

Generally lipomas should be slow growing, should not bother the pet, and should not ulcerate to the surface. If that ever stops being the case, I recommend prompt excision of the mass and a full biopsy. Sometimes early diagnostics can miss important cells, leading to an inaccurate diagnosis. Other times, another type of tumor develops on the surface or nearby a lipoma.

As with any condition, the best advice is to have a close working relationship with your veterinarian and to have any new problem checked promptly.

Prospective breeders and puppy buyers are urged to inquire as to the OFA certification of both the sire and the dam prior to any purchase. Breeders in the Stud Dog/ Breeders Listings must be CVC members. In keeping with this resolution, the CVC newsletter will not accept ads for any male Vizsla over the age of 24 months or any female Vizsla over the age of 26 months that does not have an OFA number except as follows:

- Congratulatory ads from sires and/or dams to congratulate their progeny on achievements need only have OFA numbers for the sires and/or dams whether or not the progeny is over the age of two years.
- Dogs mentioned in ads or articles of an informative nature with regard to medical or personal experiences do not require an OFA number nor those mentioned in reports.
- Memorial ads do not require an OFA number.
- All ads (except "Wags n Brags") concerning the accomplishments of a dog in performance event(s) must include dog's full OFA number and date of birth.
- "Wags n Brags" must include the following information: Full AKC registration name and number, placement awarded, location of win and owner's name
- Ads for puppy litters will not be accepted unless the sire and dam had OFA numbers at the time of breeding. Complete OFA numbers must be submitted with each request and will be printed in full. For purposes of these requirements, the deadline date for the CVC Newsletter issue in which the ad is to appear controls the question of age.

Resolution ~ The officers and boards of directors of the Vizsla Club of America and the CVC, in cognizance of the respective responsibilities to protect the breed and foster its development, do hereby condemn the breeding of dogs with serious genetic defects including: epilepsy, PRA (Progressive Retinal Atrophy), von Willebrand's disease, entropion and cranial muscular atrophy.

Code of Ethics

Sportsmanship ~ CVC members will:

- Always conduct themselves in a manner that will reflect credit upon themselves, their Vizslas and the sport of purebred dogs, regardless of the location or circumstance.
- Always protect and advance the development of the Vizsla through continued improvement of soundness, stable temperament, natural hunting ability and conformation as set forth in the official Vizsla Standard.

Health ~ CVC members will:

- Maintain the best possible standards of canine health, cleanliness and veterinary care in an atmosphere conducive to the stable development of their dogs.

Breeding ~ CVC members will:

- Breed only with the intention of im-

proving the breed by breeding only those Vizslas that conform to the standard as recognized by the American Kennel Club, exhibit soundness, stable temperament and natural hunting ability.

- Breed only those dogs that are free of serious hereditary defects (including epilepsy, progressive retinal atrophy, von Willebrand's disease, entropion and cranial muscular atrophy), are over two years of age and have been x-rayed and are OFA-certified free from hip dysplasia.

Sales ~ CVC members will:

- Not breed, sell, or consign puppies or adult dogs to pet shops or other commercial ventures such as lotteries or raffles.
- Honestly evaluate the quality of the Vizsla sold and fairly represent that evaluation and urge puppy purchasers to spay or neuter all pets that for any reason will not be used for breeding.
- Not release puppies under seven weeks of age.
- Furnish details on feeding, care, inoculations, pedigrees, and written sales agreements.
- Screen all prospective buyers to assure that puppies have safe and loving homes.
- Supply assistance and support to puppy buyers for the life of the dog.
- Encourage owners to become involved in Vizsla activities, the Conestoga Vizsla Club, the Vizsla Club of America and/or other regional Vizsla clubs.

This Code of Ethics was accepted by the Vizsla Club of America Board of Directors and the general membership on October 24, 1992. Adopted by the Conestoga Vizsla Club Board of Directors on October 15, 1997.
